



The Monroe Library offers access to more than 27,000 electronic books (eBooks) through NetLibrary. This handout describes how to set up a NetLibrary account from on or off campus and how to search for eBooks through the library catalog.

Searching for eBooks through the library catalog

You can find eBooks in the catalog by doing a Quick Search for electronic books.

1. From the library's main page <http://library.loyno.edu> type your search terms into the Catalog Quick Links box.
2. Choose Electronic Books from the pull-down menu.
3. Click on the Go button.

4. Next you will see the **Search Results** list. The Search Results list includes **only eBooks**.

5. Now, click on the **URL** to view the ebook. A new page will open and you will view the book through **NetLibrary**.

6. Before clicking on the URL, you may click on the **Details** button for more information about the book.

Viewing books in NetLibrary

In order to view eBooks, you will need to have the **Adobe Reader** plug-in 6.0 or higher.

Printing & copying. It's not possible to print or copy an entire eBook – that would be copyright infringement. You can print one page at a time or save text by using your browser's print and save functions.
